On 25 May 2014, 400 million voters will elect 751 representatives for the new European Parliament (EP). The elections have been taking place every five years since 1979, paradoxically with diminishing voter turnouts but ever-increasing powers for the parliament.

The EP is the only EU institution with directly elected members, thereby reflecting fairly accurately the 'people's will' across the entire Union. Since the 1980s, the Parliament's role has changed from a mere consultative body to a major decision maker in European affairs. The Lisbon Treaty of 2009 now also gives it the right to choose the candidate for Europe's top executive position – the next President of the European Commission. It is expected that he/she will emerge from among a small group of leaders of the main political groupings in the EP, among them Martin Schulz (current EP president) for the Socialists & Democrats, Jean-Claude Juncker (former prime minister of Luxembourg and president of the eurogroup of finance ministers) for the more conservative European People's Party, or Guy Verhofstadt (former Belgian prime minister) for the liberal ALDE group. At the same time, however, opinion polls indicate that the number of parliamentary seats for 'eurosceptics' and outright opponents of further EU integration will also increase.
